STEWARDS

District and Brotherhood Special Offering Sunday, May 20th is the second Special Offering Sunday to donate funds to the District and Brotherhood. The congregation donated a total of **\$978** to the District/Brotherhood during the first quarter of 2018. This amount represents **78%** of the quarterly pledge. Using these special contributions and \$272 from general offerings, the Stewards were able to send checks in the amount of \$625 to each organization. This is a great start towards meeting our 2018 District and Brotherhood commitments of \$2,500 for each organization or an annual total pledge of \$5,000.

Living with the earth

There is always something to learn. Judy, our new secretary, came this morning and told me she heard we shouldn't recycle tin cans. I was surprised, so I looked it up. I looked on the Recycle Nation website* and I quote: "There is often some customer confusion when it comes to recycling soup cans. The soup cans consumers buy at the grocery store these days are made out of steel and tin. While the majority of the product is made of steel, soup cans also have a thin layer of tin coating on their insides, which stops them from corroding and keeps the soup fresh. When they are simply made out of steel and tin, these cans are definitely recyclable. However, many soup cans today are also lined with bisphenol-A, a compound that makes the recycling process more difficult."

You may have heard about the effects of BPA, a chemical to avoid. Children especially should not have contact with this chemical. So how do you know which soup cans to buy? There are waxed paper cartons. Or cans at the grocery store with BPA will be marked with resin code #7, so consumers will know whether or not the compound is in the soup they are buying.

What do you do with the cans you have? Some places do recycle these carefully. But in Carlisle, right now, these cans cannot be recycled. Isn't it frustrating that after years of using regular tin and steel cans, the producers had to put in a dangerous chemical???

In case you don't know about BPA, here is a paragraph on it: "BPA, as you probably know, is an endocrine disruptor. Animal studies link it to cancer and early puberty, and at least one epidemiological study shows that adults with higher levels of BPA in their urine have increased rates of various metabolic disorders (including diabetes and cardiovascular disease." **https://www.huffingtonpost.com/maia-james/recycled-toilet-paper_b_2822188.html

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Antipasto Salad

Ingredients

Red Wine Vinaigrette:

1 bunch fresh basil, stemmed and leaves chopped (about 2 cups)
1/4 cup red wine vinegar
1 clove garlic
1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
3/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

Antipasto Salad:

1 pound fusilli pasta
1/2 cup hard salami, cut into strips (about 3 ounces)
1/2 cup smoked turkey, cut into strips (about 3 ounces)
1/4 cup provolone cheese, cut into strips
1/4 cup grated Asiago cheese
2 tablespoons green olives, halved and pitted
2 tablespoons roasted red peppers, cut into strips
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Directions

Vinaigrette: In a blender, add the basil, vinegar, garlic, mustard, salt and pepper. Blend until the herbs are finely chopped. With the machine running, drizzle in the olive oil until the dressing is smooth.

Pasta: Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over high heat. Add the pasta and cook until tender but still firm to the bite, stirring occasionally, about 8 to 10 minutes. Drain pasta.

In a large bowl, toss together the cooked pasta with the remaining salad ingredients. Drizzle with dressing and toss to coat. Serve.
